Since then, the Geographical Association has had this corrected to ensure that he has been acknowledged for this.


The Railroad: Harriet Tubman (UNCRC Article 35: Prevention of sale, UNCRC Article 2: No discrimination)



Year 4 have been learning about Harriet

Tubman, a woman born into slavery in the USA. As an abolitionist, she risked her own life to save others. She did this by creating safe houses that slaves accessed through the underground rail road. Her bravery angered some, which led to her being a wanted woman. Fortunately, she was never caught nor did she lose a slave.

"I freed a thousand slaves, I could free a thousand more if they knew they were slaves " - Tubman

Dear Mr Johnson,

I am writing to you for the sole purpose of discussing the unfortunate events that are currently unfolding in Afghanistan.

Maslow's Hierarchy of Needs clearly states that if our basic needs (such as food, water, shelter and warmth) are not met, this could cause irreversible damage. Being a refugee—someone who has had to flee their place of birth—means that this catastrophe could become a reality. To ignore these desperate people would be a horrendous act. We have to do something, don't we?

After watching the news, I am flabbergasted as to what the Taliban are doing in Afghanistan. Many poor souls, particularly women, have been forced to escape, to places such as the UK or USA, in fear of their lives! How would you, as a father, feel if you had to send your child to another country just to ensure their basic needs were met? How would you, as a human, feel if you had to flee from your home? How would you, as Prime Minister of the United Kingdom, feel if you killed thousands of lives simply because you disallowed refugees safe entry into our country?

My school, George Spicer Primary School, is a Rights Respecting School. This means we learn about the UN's Convention on the Rights of the Child. We've learnt about children's rights, and it is appalling to see that the Taliban are disallowing and disrespecting many of the UNCRC's rights to children in Afghanistan.

Please help these poor, innocent children.
